Whether you're re-connecting with us or taking the first step on your ASO journey, you have so much to look forward to in 2021. And you'll notice some innovations too.












What will never change, though, is our commitment to sharing the universal message of music's power, beauty and relevance, in inspiring performances.

Joyous

Elena Kats-Chernin's exuberant orchestral showpiece makes for a thrilling start to your ASO journey in 2021. As Kats-Chernin says: "My mother used to play Liszt's Second Hungarian Rhapsody when we lived in Russia. *Big Rhap* transfers... my early memories of the spectacle [and] merriment... of what I saw and heard in my living room!"

Soprano Siobhan Stagg brings her "impossibly beautiful voice" (The Age) to memories from a different time and place – a radiant remembrance of childhood in long-ago small-town USA, and "that time of evening when people sit on their porches, rocking gently".

By the final bars of Tchaikovsky's Fourth Symphony, you've been taken on a journey from brooding despair to wild exultation. Is there a Russian symphony that concludes more joyously than this?

Brilliance and Tenderness

Much of Robert Schumann's music was written for the piano, and his wife Clara was a legendary pianist. In Robert's concerto you hear the relationship between husband and wife come to life in music of glowing brilliance and tenderness.

Lili Boulanger was the younger sister of legendary composition teacher Nadia. Lili's death at 24 robbed the world of a beautiful musical spirit; her picture of a spring morning gives you a glimpse into her radiant musical imagination.

If you love Dvořák's symphony From the New World, you'll be captivated by the strength and darkly glowing power of his Seventh Symphony. The radiant final bars tell of a hard-fought battle against adversity; truly, this is music for our times.

Longing for Home

What a joy to welcome back Grace Clifford, who returns to the ASO as soloist in one of the world's favourite violin concertos.

The story goes that Sibelius once took a young visitor outside his house in rural Finland, embraced with a gesture the spectacular view, and said: "Here is my second symphony". This is music of home, overflowing with fervour, grandeur and love.

Miriam Hyde was in her early 20s, and not long back from her studies in London, when she created this spirited overture to honour the centenary of the founding of Adelaide in 1936 – a heart-warming musical celebration of home.

Giocoso

Pianist, conductor, teacher and composer, Ernst von Dohnányi was a giant in the world of Hungarian music, and his Sextet is a sublime example of his cosmopolitan musical style; sensuous, sophisticated and brimming with beautiful ideas. Germaine Tailleferre, the only female member of the influential band of composers known as Les Six, composed her delicate, impressionistic quartet just one year after Stravinsky created his concert drama *The Soldier's Tale*. The suite Stravinsky drew from this modern version of the Faust story is one of his most compelling chamber works.

What a brilliant celebration of the musical talent working on our doorstep. Here is Simon Cobcroft, whose artistry you've enjoyed so often in his capacity as the ASO's Principal Cellist, joining the Orchestra as soloist in one of the most delicious of all classical concertos, the second of Haydn's two masterworks for the cello.

Under the direction of Brisbane-born conductor Nathan Aspinall, the concert concludes with a pure distillation of joy, Schumann's symphony in which, as he explained, "I should like to show how everything to do with spring is coming to life". A perfect mid-winter treat!

Miraculous Mozart

The symphony by the 19-year-old Mozart is one of his 'miracle' pieces, a masterpiece from its brilliant opening movement to its comic finale.

From rage to exultation, Haydn's concert aria is a picture of a woman in emotional torment, promised in marriage to one man while yearning for another. The brilliant South Australian soprano Jessica Dean will take you over this vast emotional terrain, under the baton of another superb local artist, Luke Dollman.

Had Mozart or Haydn never existed, the name you would probably know as the great classical-era composer of orchestral music would be CPE Bach (a son of Johann Sebastian). His bold, exuberant symphonies contain some of the most adventurous sounds of their time.



In collaboration with Adelaide Festival Centre's Guitar Festival 2021, the ASO is thrilled to present Nigel Westlake's Concerto for Two Guitars, *Toward Takayna*, written for Australia's iconic guitar duo, Slava and Leonard Grigoryan. Presented on Anzac Day eve, the program also includes the haunting orchestral suite Westlake created from his music for Hannie Rayson's play *The Glass Soldier*. Westlake tells the incredible story of Nelson Ferguson, blinded on the killing fields of World War I, and the wonder, love and resolution of his life.
