I love this book. Angela McAllister's brilliant prose and Grahame Baker-Smith's vibrant imagery transports readers, young and old, through a world full of wonder.

Set in a dazzling fairground, *Leon and the Place Between* is an adventure-story that not only presents a cavalcade of circus performers, it also explores more serious issues such as trust, confidence and self-belief. The book sits perfectly in the middle of the primary school curriculum so young readers will marvel at the spectacle of the story, while older children can't fail to be impressed by Angela's clever use of language and Graham's detailed illustrations.

My musical setting of the book will be the centrepiece of our concert programme and we'd like to invite your students to take part in its performance. Although the music will be performed as a continuous 18-minute work, the score can be easily broken into short

I don't believe in magic, No way – it's never real, I don't believe in magic.


It can't be true, It's just not true, It's only clever tricks.

So I don't believe in magic.










MUSIC





This isn't so much of a song but a simple refrain that pops up during the Juggler's routine (PRACTICE TRACK 2) and also in the magical carousel (PRACTICE TRACK 3).

Try to sing this phrase as softly and mysteriously as possible.

Immediately before you sing, you will hear this theme played in the orchestra by the bass clarinet. Listen out for its sound.

Listen also for the triangle. It will give you a clear sign as to when to start singing.


Before you sing Abdul Kazam's name, you will hear it played triumphantly by the brass. Aim to sing the phrase below with as much power as you can - but make sure you don't shout!



PRACTICE TRACK 6

This phrase appears three times throughout the story. On the second and third occasions, you sing it a little higher.





When Abdul Kazam's magic transports Leon to the 'Place Between' the orchestra play six explosive chords.


We'd like you to join us in each of those chords, by clapping in time with the music.

The chart to the right shows the orchestra's rhythmical sequence. Start by counting out loud, reading line by line, left to right, from top to bottom. Now, try clapping every-time you say the number 1.

Finally, don't count aloud - count the numbers silently in your head. Then try clapping along with PRACTICE TRACK 7.

In the Place Between, Leon meets a boy who takes him on an exhilarating magic carpet ride. This music is fast and exciting and we need your help for this adventure. The words and music below are very simple. The trick is to listen out for the sound of the phrase played by the violins because you will sing it immediately afterwards.

Notice that this music is a little higher here. It also has an extra 'fragment' right at the end. Make sure you sing these final words very softly.

During his adventure, Leon discovers a magician's rabbit trapped in the 'Place Between'. This is a sad song about her.


TOP TIP

Even though this music is very soft, you will need to take in as much air as possible to sing your very best. Ensuring you take a big, deep breath but don't lift your shoulders as you do it! Aim to sing this song with the most beautiful sound you can.
