I will go through the curtains to a room with armchairs and a desk. I can sit in the chairs or the quiet spaces.




I can look at the two large staircases and the light above my head, but I cannot touch these.

Trombone Tuba






These are the brass instruments.

There will be a man standing at the front of the orchestra. He is the conductor.


His name is Carlo.

At the start of the concert the orchestra will tune their instrument, making different sounds.





Some of the music might be loud.
