Welcome to the Adelaide Symphony Orchestra's 90th season, a yearlong birthday party that promises performances of raw emotion and orchestral brilliance, creating memories that will last long after the final notes have sounded.

Since the orchestra began, hundreds of musicians and thousands of listeners have come together to share in the unique experience of live music. Anniversaries acknowledge the passing of time, yet every performance by the ASO is a moment of time suspended. Live music enables us to put our lives on hold, and to be present in the here and now. The Adelaide Symphony Orchestra is also unfinished. We have so much more to play, so much more to hear, so much more to be part of. Music is a timeless force for good, a force that is infinitely more powerful when experienced live. Whether you have been listening to the ASO for 90 years or have not found the opportunity to join us yet, I hope you will be able to come and embrace the power of orchestral sound, and be part of hearing the now.

There is nothing short-changed about the two movements that Schubert must have realised were perfect as they stood. And Deryck Cooke's performing version of Mahler's Tenth Symphony allows us to hear this piece as the composer left it. A fragile, autobiographical journey that charts a path through longing and grief towards a conclusion of uplifting acceptance, the truth of which can only come through love.

Since 1936, our musicians have poured everything into every performance – not just precision, but passion. As we celebrate our 90th year, we honour the legacy behind us and the future still to be written. Every concert is a promise to be present, to feel deeply, and to create lasting memories.



First Movement 1936–1966

The Adelaide Symphony
Orchestra began in 1936 as
a small ABC radio ensemble
of just 15 musicians under
its first conductor, William
Cade. The players gathered
for their first rehearsal on
6 January 1936, with a
performance broadcast
by ABC radio a week later.
Public performances soon
followed, with the Orchestra's
first full symphonic concert
featuring the brilliant Australian
pianist Eileen Joyce.

From the outset, the ASO forged significant artistic partnerships. Among the earliest was a 1937 performance at the Adelaide Town Hall, when guest conductor Professor Bernard Heinze led the orchestra in a concert with famed violinist Bronisław Huberman. In 1946, the ASO collaborated with the Adelaide Philharmonic Choir on Mendelssohn's Elijah, featuring bass baritone Harold Williams under choirmaster Norman Chinner.

The Orchestra entered a new chapter in 1949, reforming as the 55-member South Australian Symphony Orchestra with Henry Krips appointed as resident conductor, cementing its place in the state's cultural life.

Second Movement 1967 - 1996

The 60s through to the 90s was a period of growing recognition for the ASO. A defining highlight came in 1968 at the Adelaide Festival, when the Orchestra joined with the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra, eight Adelaide choirs, and a line-up of soloists under Henry Krips for a monumental performance of Mahler's Symphony No.8, Symphony of a Thousand.

In 1973, the ASO stood at the heart of a historic cultural moment, performing at the opening gala of the newly built Festival Theatre on King William Road. Conducted by Ladislav Slovák, the program featured the finale of Beethoven's *Fidelio* alongside the triumphant Ninth Symphony.

By its 60th birthday, the Orchestra's reputation extended beyond Australia's shores, with its first international tour in 1996 taking the musicians to Singapore, Hong Kong and China – marking an exciting new chapter on the world stage.

Third Movement 1997—Today

Before the turn of the century in 1998, the Orchestra reached a new artistic milestone, performing in the State Opera of South Australia's groundbreaking production of Wagner's Ring Cycle – the first time *The Ring* had been performed in its entirety in Australia.

Strong artistic leadership has shaped partnerships with artists including Sir Jeffrey Tate, Arvo Volmer, Nicholas Braithwaite, Pinchas Zukerman, Nicholas Carter, Cathy Milliken, and its current Chief Conductor Mark Wigglesworth. The ASO has grown its commitment to contemporary Australian music including the Australian Premiere of Brett Dean's acclaimed opera Hamlet at the 2018 Adelaide Festival.

Diversity, inclusivity, and accessibility define the ASO of today. The Orchestra has reached new audiences through collaborations with artists including the Hilltop Hoods, The Angels, Miaow Miaow, Tim Minchin, and Kate Miller-Heidke. In 2021, following post-pandemic lockdowns, the ASO's Festival of Orchestra brought thousands together. And, in 2024, the ASO partnered with the Adelaide Festival and the University of Adelaide to create Floods of Fire, a participatory and multicultural city-wide celebration of music and storytelling which involved thousands of South Australians.

In a celebration of culture, voice and innovation, the ASO presents the first performances of three groundbreaking new works curated by the Centre for Aboriginal Studies in Music (CASM) and Soundstream New Music.

Each piece is a unique act of musical storytelling, interweaving cultural heritage with contemporary forms such as country, gospel, hymn singing and more. The works are composed by Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara man Elisha Umuhuri, Arabana man Nathan May, Pitjantjatjara woman Makinti Minutjukur, and the Pitjantjatjara women of the Inarma choir.

This event marks the culmination of a multi-year collaborative project and the ongoing artistic relationship between CASM, Soundstream New Music, and the ASO.

Ancestral knowledge and modern expression converge for a concert which resonates with deep connection to Country, community, and the vibrancy of First Nations music in Australia.




